The Growth and Social Protection Strategy, which is a policy guide for national development, anticipates the fisheries sector to make a greater contribution to the Gross Domestic Product (GDP). This will be through the creation of employment and income earnings opportunities in the sector, providing greater social and economic stability at the community level, poverty reduction, and contributing to national food security. This policy is further expressed and expanded on in the draft Fisheries and Aquaculture Policy (2012 – 2037), created to guide the long-term development of the fisheries and aquaculture sector.

Taking into consideration these policy objectives, all the activities of the Fisheries Division are done under three themes, these are; Research and Development, Training and Extension and Education and Awareness. These key activities are centered on providing effective training in areas of fishing business management, gear technology, capacity building for fishers and recovery following the ravages of tropical storm Erika on the sector. Notwith-standing the emphasis placed on the key activities, conservation and management of our fisheries resources, including the coastal marine environment, is critical for ensuring sustainable resource utilization. Broader financial policies by Government such as low-interest loans, and in some instances, grants, through various financial institutions, have made it possible for fishers to transition from wooden to fibre-reinforced plastic(FRP) boats. The increased lifespan, improved safety and easy installation of storage or an ice box inherent to FRP boats means improved return on investment and fish quality to more traditional boat types available locally. Additionally, fishers are able to purchase more technologically advanced engines that have greater fuel efficiency and reduce carbon emissions. These investments have spawned sub-sectors such as FRP boat construction in Layou, Soufriere and Portsmouth, where affordable, good-quality boats are constructed by locals. This has dramatically reduced the importation of similar vessels from abroad, created employment and increased the output of local business which specialize in sale of marine products.

In 2016 estimated fish catch totalled at 1,143 tonnes (t), compared to 945 tonnes in 2015, a 17% increase in fish production. Notably, the Basic Fisherman Training Course (BFTC), the flagship training programme of the Fisheries Division, recently reached the milestone of over 1000 fishers trained since its inception in 2005. There is an increasing demand for fresh fish from Dominica by overseas markets. Exports for 2016 contributed over half a million dollars to the local economy, easing the problem of oversupply, post-harvest loss and stabilizing fish prices for fishers on the local market.

However, despite the improvement in the sector there are still challenges which are being addressed such as inadequate infrastructure, implementation of international food safety standards and requirements such as Sanitary and Phyto-Sanitary (SPS) measures for the local and export markets. There are also international issues relevant to the continued development of our fishery which our fishers should be cognisant of, such as the ongoing World Trade Organisation (WTO) negotiations on Fisheries Subsidies, which has the global mandate to implement the UN SDGs 14.6 for action to be taken against "overcapacity and overfishing." In this regard, we continue to work closely with the Ministry of Trade advocating on behalf of the fisheries sector towards a country position to secure special and differential treatment for developing countries in respect to subsidy prohibitions. In closing, it is important to note the functions of the Fisheries Division cannot be delivered without the collaboration of stakeholders in the fishery sector including local, regional and international development agencies and academic institutions.

NDFD's TIPS

LOAN REQUIREMENTS

- Basic personal information (ID, Proof of address)
- Pro-forma Invoices
- Credit Reports
- Business Plans (for loans above \$10,000)
- Financial statements/Records (for existing clients)
- Food handler's permit (if you are involved in food preparation)
- Liquor license (if you are involved in selling alcohol)
- Parlor license
- Collateral (are dependent on the loan amount)

Collateral can either be:

- Guarantor
- Cash security
- Lien on either fixed deposit or the surrender value of life i nsurance policy
- Caveat on a certificate of Title
- Bill of Sale on vehicle

TIPS

- Clients should ensure that they have their fishing license to conduct any fishing activities (e.g) diving, long line fishing, net fishing.
- Fisher folks should ensure that they are accompanied by a dock man or another licensed fisher folk incase of any emergencies.
- Fisher folks are encouraged to have at least two outboard motors on their fishing vessels.

- Periodically check all safety equipment to ensure that they are in good working order.
- Make sure there is communication equipment, compasses, GPS & fully charged telephones for the journey.
- Attend refresher courses like the basic fisherman training course hosted by the Fisheries Division

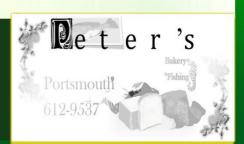

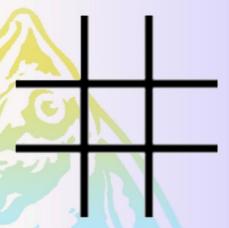

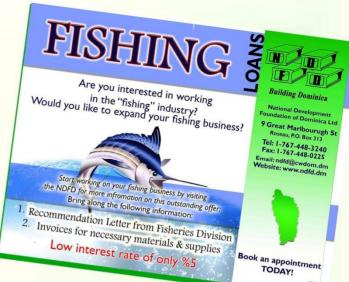
