JANET WRIGHT



Ms Wright is a female business woman involved in farming. She currently cultivates 3.8 acres of land with root crops such as yams and sweet potatoes, plantains, bananas and a wide range of vegetables to include tomatoes, cabbage, carrots and lettuce. Her farming business has been in development for the past eight years and began as a result of her passion for the field. Ms. Wright was introduced to farming at a very young age by her family, whom she would assist with the planting and harvesting of crops after school. She is currently able to supply supermarkets such as Whitchurch and Save-A-Lot, however the majority of her produce is sold to hucksters who then travel to St. Kitts, Monserrat, St. Marteen and Martinique to sell the produce.

To her, she has already realized the goals of her business but has a desire to provide her produce to a larger market in the near future. She has come to realize that amidst the difficulties associated with this industry, she is contented and grateful for the experience of establishing her own business. According to Ms. Wright, the realization of her goals would not have been possible without the help of NDFD; therefore she is very grateful for the institution. She encourages women to see the value in being independent, something they can accomplish for establishing their own business. Her message to female entrepreneurs is "Stand up, hold you head high and reach for your goal!"



FERMINE LAYNE

Ms. Layne is the owner of Green Hutts Punches. She established this business over two years ago and has expanded her product line to include twenty seven (27) different flavors of punches. Her product line includes special flavors such as Exotic Love and Well Badea. A few years ago, during her search for a local punch that would satisfy the yearning in her taste buds, Ms. Layne realized that there lacked a distinctive punch supplier on the Island. She therefore began the production of her own punches which received very good feedback from her friends and family, who then encouraged her to start her own business.

Her initial customers included friends who would purchase her punches for parties. Ms. Layne currently sells her punches at local bars and supermarkets, which proves the potential of her products. It is her intention to expand to enable export throughout the region and internationally. She expressed her appreciation to the NDFD for the startup capital that she received and providing her with an avenue to promote the business attheir annual Creole in the Streets event. Ms. Layne's message to female entrepreneur is "Hold onto your dreams. Although it is very challenging particularly in regards to acquiring the financial assistance needed, envision your future and you will realize it!"

It is her intention to expand her business to enable the provision of her products across the Island and to provide employment to unemployed individuals on the Island. 


